#### The thesis:

<u>1 Pet. 2:11–12</u> – Beloved, I urge you as aliens and [sojourners] to abstain from fleshly lusts which wage war against the soul. <sup>12</sup>[by keeping] your behavior excellent among the Gentiles, so that in the thing in which they slander you as evildoers, they may because of your good deeds, as they observe them, glorify God in the day of visitation.

What does living righteously out in the world look like?


One of the greatest ways true, Christian character shows itself is in *willing* \_\_\_\_\_\_ to others.

<u>1 Pet. 2:13</u> – **Submit yourselves** for the Lord's sake to every human institution...

<u>1 Pet. 2:18</u> – Servants, **be submissive** to your masters with all respect...

<u>1 Pet. 2:21</u> – ... Christ also suffered for you, **leaving you an example** for you to follow in His steps

<u>1 Pet. 3:1</u> – In the same way, you wives, **be submissive** to your own husbands...



### I. The Command (vv13–14)

- 'Governors' covers all different kinds of governing authorities.
  - 1. We're supposed to recognize delegated authority as just as legitimate as the one who sends it.
  - 2. We're supposed to submit to all levels of government.
- Human government has two main functions:
  - 1. Punishing evil
  - 2. Rewarding good

# What happens when government is not fulfilling what God says it should do?

Rom. 13:1–2 – Every person is to be in subjection to the governing authorities. For there is no authority except from God, and those which exist are established by God. <sup>2</sup>Therefore whoever resists authority has opposed the ordinance of God; and they who have opposed will receive condemnation upon themselves.

## III. The Bigger Picture (v16)

 The freedom we have is meant to be used to love another, not indulge our flesh.

Gal. 5:13–14 – For you were called to freedom, brethren; only do not turn your freedom into an opportunity for the flesh, but through love serve one another. <sup>14</sup>For the whole Law is fulfilled in one word, in the statement, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself."
